Emergency Clinics

If you ever have a potential emergency and we are closed, please contact one of the following emergency clinics. We recommend that you prepare for a potential emergency by keeping the telephone number of the clinic in an accessible place at home (e.g. attached to the refrigerator!) and in your cell phone contacts list. It is a good idea to familiarize yourself with the travel route to the emergency clinic also.

Emergency clinics are typically open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It is always a good idea to still call ahead as sometimes these clinics are at capacity and unable to take on new cases.

Consider taking your pet to an emergency clinic if you are noticing any of these symptoms:

DRY HEAVING OR POSSIBLE BLOATING - DIFFICULTY BREATHING OR CHOKING - DIFFICULTY GIVING BIRTH - FALL FROM HEIGHT - FOREIGN BODY OR POISON INGESTION - SERIOUS TRAUMA (HIT BY CAR) - REPEATED SEIZURES - NOT EATING OR DRINKING FOR 2+ DAYS - UNCONSCIOUSNESS OR COLLAPSE - PARALYSIS.

Urgent Care Facilities

ABSCESSES - COUGHING - EAR INFECTIONS - FEVER - HIVES/SWELLING REACTIONS - LIMPING - MINOR VOMITING OR DIARRHEA - SKIN ALLERGIES - SUPERFICIAL CUTS OR WOUNDS
